

INSTRUCTIONS

How to get here:

Start of the walk: Borough of Southwark; New Globe Walk St.

Underground: St Paul's (Central line), London Bridge (750m) (Northern and Jubilee lines), Mansion House (750m) (District and Circles lines).

Bus: RV1 to Summer Street; 45, 63, 100 to Blackfriars Bridge; 11, 15, 17, 23, 16, 76 to Mansion house; 381 to Southwark Street, 344 to Southwark Bridge Road.

Train: London Bridge (750m), Waterloo, Blackfriars, Cannon Street.

Car: Not quite convenient. There are two Blue Badge Parking Bays in New Globe Walk and another in Park Street (under the bridge). There is an NCP car park on Upper Thames Street.

Walkers will meet on the left hand side of the **Shakespeare's Globe Theatre (New Globe Walk)**.

This entrance is quite convenient as there is a good disabled access, because of the broad street. There will be a member of staff greeting the walkers at a table with a clearly marked Artsline banner. Each walker will be given a note of the route, and an Artsline T-shirt.

An Artsline representative will accompany the walkers and (Name of Celebrity to be announced) will open the walk and send the walkers on their way.

Route of the walk in order of buildings passed:

- Shakespeare's Globe
- The Tate Modern is the next building with adapted toilets. We have a table situated there for a signing in book and some soft drink. Eventually we propose people to have a short look inside the museum, spend 15 min in there, and carry on.
- At Rail Blackfriars Bridge and Blackfriars Bridge walkers will find themselves in front of a narrow walk, beside an arch hall full of restaurants, shops, and little galleries, where they can spend a few minutes.
- The OXO Tower is at the end of this arch. This area of the route is a narrow walk, between the river and the arch hall with lots of pedestrians.
- Bernie Spain Gardens is a good place to rest. Besides the gardens is a charming square.
- At Gabriel Wharf is a wheelchair ramp and people can stroll around, having a look at shops, and curious wood sculptures. It's also possible to have a break and lunch on a restaurant terrace.
- The National Theatre has adapted toilets.
- BFI. Accessible toilets
- Southbank Centre buildings:
 - SBC QEH & Purcell
 - SBC Hayward Gallery
 - SBC Riverside & Terrace

Along the Festival Riverside, right under the Jubilee Bridge is the Southbank Book Market.

- SBC Royal Festival Hall, which also has adapted toilets for disabled people. *The Royal Festival Hall is only accessible by stairs, however there is a ramp available for disabled access on the left hand side of the main stairs.*
- Saison Poetry Library.

- Jubilee Gardens is a large grassed area ideal for a leisurely stroll.
- The London Eye is next to Jubilee Gardens.

On the left hand side of the London Aquarium is a wheelchair access and the toilets there are also accessible.

From this point of route walkers return the same way to the Globe Theatre.

At the End:

All Walkers are asked to sign in at an Artsline table so that a check can be made of how many people finished the route. Light refreshments will be available and an Artsline representative will congratulate / thank all those who have taken part.
